A few days before Christmas, while doing a little shopping, I came across an angel pin and Emerson's quote was printed on the attached card. It was an immediate purchase. As the next day or two passed, reading various personal stories of those in need, those who were seeking to help those in need, and those whose needs seem to eclipse the realm of possibilities, something began to resonate with me. It was the value of the library in connection with each of these three situations.

The value of the library is not the designated building – however beautiful a landmark it might be - but that it is the source of powerful information and resources that can alter our paths for the better. And that the information and resource for the greater part are free.

For those who need help to find work; for those who need access to technological tools; those who wish to offer their knowledge by volunteering to help those in need; those who wish to read better or to learn to read because they were unable to conquer that [important] life skill at an earlier age; those who wish to travel through the excursions of written journeys, or films; for those in need of fun – tiny, young, and old. All can be found in the library.

### The Friends of the Library are Friends of Books

Book sales! It may sound simple, but the Library has a group of six dedicated volunteers who carry out an intricate system of sorting, pricing, and storing donated books to raise money for the Library.

When donated items come in, they are sent to the sorting room (SR) where a group of volunteers begin the sorting process. In order to price them, they look the books up on Amazon. Depending upon the value, the books may be sold there. Those not sold on Amazon are chosen for Oceanside's weekly Farmers Market. Each week, five boxes of different adult books, three boxes of children's books, as well as classics and antique books are brought out to the market to sell.

Both the Civic Center and Mission Branch Libraries will receive six to ten boxes of books for their respective 'little corner bookstores' "The remaining books that don't sell are packed up for our quarterly Book Sales," says Gail Wells, Lead Book Sorting and Sales Volunteer.

At the beginning of each month, a different color dot is affixed to each book in order to tell how long they've been on the shelves. The books are on a four or five week rotation schedule. Over that period, the books on sale are sold for  $\frac{1}{2}$  price, \$1.00, or \$.50. At the end of this cycle they are returned to the SR and boxed up for the next cycle, at which time they are double dotted. Sometimes the books have a black dot on them. This is because the books are exchanged between the Mission and Civic Center stores."

"We also try to accommodate our patrons by taking orders for special books and if we can locate the book, we will notify the interested patron," says Gail, who always wants satisfied customers.

Now you can see that the selling of books is not a breeze. The library has this wonderful group of people sorting, pricing, staging the Farmers Market, shelving and selling. It's intensive work but they all pitch in together because Friends of the Library are friends of books. This helps to make Oceanside Public Library extraordinary.



### Spotlight on Ashley Simpkins: A Volunteer Friend

Who's afraid of Ashley Simpkins? No one is, because her smile immediately welcomes you; engaging and accepting.

Ashley came to California in the summer of 2011, arriving from upstate New York, "leaving behind the cold weather forever," she says, though she admits the seasons other than winter were beautiful. Her older sister preceded her, having moved to Carlsbad in 2005. After becoming

A New Year and A New Look by Sherri Cosby, Library Director

During the first few months of 2014, we are making some noticeable changes at both the Civic Center and Mission Branch Libraries.

Due to the generous and ongoing support of the Oceanside Public Library Foundation, we have replaced the stair carpet at the Civic Center Library with a much more durable rubber stairway system. With over 250,000 visitors each year, you can only imagine the wear and tear those stairs take. This new stairway system is much easier to maintain, and will last for years to come.

Our second noticeable change will be at the Mission Branch Library. It's time for new carpet! The Mission Branch Library opened in September of 1999, as part of the Police/Library Facilities Project. For the past 14 years, the Mission Branch has provided programs and services to the residents of Oceanside who live in the eastern part of the City. The Branch has had over 2.5 million visitors during this 14 year period, and is annually responsible for 45 percent of the Library's total circulation.

In addition to replacing the flooring at the Mission Branch, we will be replacing the old mismatched shelving that is currently in the Children's Room and scattered throughout the building. There are also plans to update the customer services desks, make room for more seating, and much more. The Oceanside Public Library Foundation has pledged \$52,000 for this project. Branch Manager CJ DiMento is currently working on this project, and has also received several nice donations to help with some new artwork for the Children's area. We anticipate the project will take about a month to complete, so the Branch will be closed during the month of March 2014. Plan to visit in April to see our great new space.





# Get Ready for an exciting month of programs!


For the third time in as many tries, the Oceanside Public Library has received a National Endowment for Arts Grant. The Big Read is a community-wide reading program, and Oceanside was



honored to be one of only 75 libraries nationwide selected by the NEA to host a Big Read. This year's selection features the quintessential detective novel, *The Maltese Falcon* by Dashiell Hammett. Special events will take place during the month of February 2014, and include book discussions, special celebrity guest Julie Rivett (granddaughter of Dashiell Hammett), author panels, a screening of the classic movie starring Humphrey Bogart as Sam Spade, a concert featuring the music of *film noir*, and much more. Film noir, French for "black cinema," is a term that describes a movie with a bleak setting, cynical attitudes, menacing undercurrents, and *femme fatales*.

# Falcon Fest: Who Was Dashiell Hammett?

Our library's Big Read selection, *The Maltese Falcon*, is included in Modern Library's list of the 100 best English language novels of the 20<sup>th</sup> century. It startled the reading public with its unusual portrayal of a hard-boiled private detective, Sam Spade, struggling to unravel an extremely

complicated crime in the midst of a swirling, murderous group of con men and women. All subsequent stories of cold and ruthless private detectives owe their inspiration to Sam Spade. Let's take a look at the pioneering writer, Dashiel Hammett, who created this icon.

Hammett was born on a farm in St. Mary's County, MD, in 1894. He dropped out of school when he was 13 or 14 and found work at a variety of menial jobs until he was able to land a spot at Pinkerton's Detective Agency in 1915. He stayed with Pinkerton's until 1922, taking a brief time off to serve in the Army during WWI. The detectives gave Hammett a unique view of the callous, independent nature of their work, of their vocabulary, their life styles, and of their frequently angry interactions with the police.

Using material from his work at Pinkerton's, Hammett began publishing fiction in pulp magazines, gradually becoming a skilled writer of detective stories. *Red Harvest* and *The Drain Curse* appeared as his first novels in 1929, and *The Maltese Falcon* made its appearance a year later. The latter novel was so popular that it eventually was made into several motion pictures, the most famous being produced in 1941 as a "film noir" classic starring Humphrey Bogart, Peter Lorre, Sidney Greenstreet, and Mary Astor.

In 1934, Hammett penned *The Thin Man*, featuring the detective couple Nick and Nora Jones, which led to a series of very popular movies starring William Powell and Myrna Loy. Nora was based on the writer Lillian Hellman, who was Hammet's lover, companion, editor, and nurse, from 1930, until his death on June 10, 1961 from lung cancer. He is buried in Arlington National Cemetery in honor of his Army service in both world wars. (Their relationship was portrayed in the 1977 film *Julia*, acted by Jason Robards and Jane Fonda.)

Both Hammett and Hellman incurred the wrath of the House on Un-American Activities Committee (HUAC, pronounced "wack" as in "wacky") in the red-hunting paranoia of the 1950's. For refusing to answer questions about his Communist Party affiliations -- and thus betraying his fellow writers and artists -- Hammett served a prison sentence. Hellman also refused to testify in 1952. She wrote about this ordeal in her 1976 memoir, aptly named *Scoundrel Time*. Hellman died in 1984.

Many think that Sam Spade is the type of man Hammett most admired: strong, determined, and coldy detached from the chaos surrounding him. See what you think.

In 2013 the Library had over 20 local artists represented in eight different shows, all with their own private and intimate receptions.

Through artworks from local residents visitors were able to travel all around Oceanside, throughout Mexico, China, and India, and into some make-believe landscapes. The Library was also honored to display artwork from local Native American Artists, both widely published and displayed in the Smithsonian. The Library has worked with local non profit arts organization, Hill Street Country Club, to bring in more local artists and to conduct art making workshops. 
