# **NATIONAL LIBRARY WEEK:** It's Meaning, It's Measure!

April 12 – 18 was the week for celebrating libraries, an initiative of the American Library Association (ALA) first sponsored in 1958. According to the ALA, "Today's libraries are more than just books. Increasingly they are places of creativity where people can meet to share a hobby, use a 3D printer, edit a video, or use software to record their own music. Libraries offer access to the tools and technology essential to the economic and cultural lives of their communities."

This year, David Baldacci, best-selling author and literacy advocate, served as Honorary Chair for National Library Week. It was enlightening and inspiring to learn that in addition to his numerous books and film and television adaptations, Baldacci is involved with his family's Wish You Well Foundation, which fosters and promotes the development and expansion of literacy and educational programs.

This year marked 20 years of the Festival of Books, a two-day celebration supported by the Los Angeles Times and held on the USC campus. The event features author panels and communication sessions, celebrity appearances, cooking demonstrations, art and photo installations, music performances, film screenings and hundreds of booksellers and exhibitors. Cruising the crowds at the festival were two high school students who helped their Los Angeles school begin a Reading Club that eventually became an integral partner of their city's Big Read.

The love of literature runs deep for many, especially those with a role in libraries. Embracing and holding up literature in its many forms remains a vital force. Think on this: Libraries are truly the most diverse and least biased entities imaginable. Every day across the country they open their doors to everyone, making no judgments, but rather offering support, hope, enjoyment, and education. We are thankful for this freedom of expression.

Hanging in the Civic Center Oceanside Public Library - just across from the elevator - was a poster for National Library Week with one of my favorite quotes: "The more you read, the more you know. The more you know, the smarter you grow. The smarter you grow, the stronger your voice, when speaking your mind or making your choice." WOW!

As a tutor with our READS Literacy Center, I think this could –perhaps even should – be our mantra; these are words that can and should encourage those who need help with reading; whether to learn to read, or to improve their reading skills. Whether younger or older, we must keep the flame burning to read. Whether realbooks or eBooks. Whether diagrams or instructions in written hard copy, or virtual txt, one needs to know how to read words. Let us all help those who need help to get help - FREE - from Oceanside Public Library's Oceanside READS Literacy Center. # **BOOK SALES NOTES AND NEWS**

#### **Farmers Market**

The Farmers Market is an integral part of the Library's fundraising efforts, and nine Friends volunteers are an integral part of the market's success. The following people staff different shifts during the six hour day: Regina, Sylvia, Elizabeth, Mary N., Mary M., Jane, OraLee, Laena, and our newest helper Ted. We couldn't function without them.

Setting up for the market is the most difficult part of the day because more than 16 boxes (20-25 books per box) of new books are brought out and then must be integrated with the ones already on the carts. The skilled volunteers complete this important and tedious task in 45 minutes to an hour, when for others, it could take hours.

Books are brought out on carts that have been organized to identify and feature categories more efficiently. There is a large section designated to tweens and children, and non-fiction categories such as art, military, inspiration, travel, crafts, and cooking are also available on labeled shelves.

Many of the items available are paperbacks that sell at half price (\$2.00=\$1.00, \$1.00=.50¢, .50¢=.25¢). During the months of this past February and March, the sales yield was just shy of \$6,000. This was only possible because of all the wonderful donations of books and materials received from community members and Library supporters.

Our volunteers spend considerable time becoming familiar with the stock and therefore are knowledgeable in helping patrons find the books they want and may even suggest others. The volunteers will even take orders and look for the specific books requested.

Frenzy normally ensues for the volunteers at breakdown, which is made even more chaotic at the shutdown of the market because latecomers are trying to buy books and volunteers are busy trying to bring the stacked carts back into the Library. It is like a dance ritual of carts moving and stopping while at the same time continuing to sell books.

And though the volunteers endure this weekly adrenalin surge, they return to the inner sanctum of the Library Sorting Room in one piece, often with smiles, laughter, and stories to be shared amongst themselves.

The sales of donated books and items remain a phenomenon of importance. Books are also sold at the yearly Days of Art Faire and this year's yield was \$2,300, compared to last year's \$1,800. The Friends are grateful for the many contributions and hope to only increase them in the future.

#### **Quarterly Book Sales**

The Friends also feature four Big Book Sales per year. Many more amazing volunteers make these awesome book buying opportunities available. The average proceeds of these sales is approximately \$2,500 each, and are another avenue in which money is raised that, in turn, makes Library books, materials, and programming available to the public.

# Children's Department: Summer Reading is Here!

This year children, teens, and adults at the Oceanside Public Library will "Read to the Rhythm!" This fun musicalthemed Summer Reading Program runs from June 5 to August 1. Our annual Summer Reading Program is important to our community because research has shown that children who do not read during summer break can fall behind two months in their reading achievement (Reading is Fundamental). This is known as the "summer reading slide." Fortunately, generous support from the Friends of the Library makes the Summer Reading Program beneficial and engaging to Oceanside families and helps overcome this challenge. Children are rewarded for reading and encouraged to share their reading experience with others through book reviews and drawings. Families are invited to further explore literature through Storytimes, crafts, and displays. Additionally, there are many free fun activities and

special events for families offered, highlighting the musical summer theme. Musicians, magicians, animals, and puppet shows will be featured throughout the summer. The Library will provide additional opportunities for kids to participate in some of its very popular programs, such as Science Fun, Minecraft and LEGO Build, which appeal to kids of all ages. Children and teens will have the opportunity to come together to create their own musical instruments,

experiment with real ones, learn from specialists in the field, and make music themselves, all while being encouraged to read, read, read!





# Spotlight on Donna McClintock Remembering a One-of-a-Kind Volunteer

Some people just seem to light up a room. Donna McClintock was one of those people. She first began volunteering for the Library about ten years ago. Peggy and Fred Downing well remember when she first came to us. They were in charge of the weekly sorting and shelving at the Mission Branch Library. She caught on quickly and was cheerfully devoted to her work. She always did the jobs no one else wanted. When the Mission Branch Library was closed for refreshing and reorganizing, she and the Downings were still there, helping out.

Donna spent most of her younger years in San Diego. She graduated from Lincoln High School in 1962, and began working as a secretary for San Diego County. She finished her career in public service serving as district secretary for State Senator William Craven for 20 years, according to Ted Marioncelli, a very close friend for 41 years. He has known

Donna as "one of the nicest persons I have ever met. She exuded goodness and was always so proud of her public service."

Donna came to a Friends Board Meeting in late 2014 with a fundraising idea. She had heard Dr. Richard Lederer's presentations and felt that he could draw in a good crowd who would pay to listen to him and donate to the Library at the same time. The Board agreed to plan the event and hold it on February 13, 2015.

The event was enthusiastically attended. Donna suffered a massive stroke and passed exactly one month later.

Dr. Lederer, upon hearing of her unexpected death remembers her as a caring and compassionate person. "She gives as naturally as she breathes. Heaven is better for her being there."

A memorial service was held on May 2 at the Generations Church with buriel at the San Luis Rey Mission Cemetery. In lieu of flowers, the family has requested donations to the Friends of the Oceanside Public Library.

# Focus on the Boards: Who are they? And what do they do?

# Library Board of Trustees **Est.** 1904

In 1904, the City Council took action to officially establish a Public Library and appointed a Board of Trustees as its governing Board. The primary responsibility of all members of governing City commissions, boards, and committees is to

represent the City and advise elected officials and staff on policies pertaining to services and programs.

The Library Board of Trustees sets policy and makes all rules and regulations pertaining to the Library hours of operation, services provided, and the selection of materials placed in the facilities. The Board directly supports and promotes the Library's mission: To engage, inform, connect, and inspire, and its vision: The Oceanside Public Library will be the cultural heart of Oceanside, empowering the community by promoting literacy, information access, civic engagement, cultural inclusiveness, and openness to new ideas.

The five members of the Board serve at the pleasure of the City Council, do not make political decisions or act in any capacity reserved for elected officials. Members are appointed by the Mayor to represent the entire community and not exclusively the viewpoint of a participating group or interest. Members of the Board maintain regular interface with the Friends of the Library and the Library Foundation in order to maintain a strong and informed advocacy program.

# Friends of the library **GG. 1971**

In the beginning of July 1971, a small group of individuals known as the Friends of the Oceanside Public Library launched its first major fund drive in support of establishing a new Library facility for Oceanside. Posters appeared on buses, numerous newspaper articles were published, and individual donor solicitations were robust, including Lifetime Memberships. Near the end of July, \$3,300 had been raised with 636 members on the list - an increase of nearly 150 new members. By August 5, the member count rested at 844. On August 20, 1971, the Friends of the Oceanside Public Library became incorporated. In 1972, the Friends received approval of their not-for-profit status.

The mission of the Friends is: To support and promote the services and resources of the Library through community involvement, volunteer activities, and fundraising. organization maintains a membership of persons interested in the Library, and through its fundraising efforts, sponsors

special programs and cultural events for both children and adults, and works to enhance the Library's collection and facilities.

Funds raised in support of this mission augment the annual funding from City of Oceanside. In 1971, The Friends raised \$23,238 from memberships, donations, book sales, and other special events. In 2015, their efforts resulted in \$128,622 raised.

# Library Foundation Est. 2003

Since its inception, the Foundation has received community members serving on its Board. 

# **Requirements for Tutoring Adults**

- Be at least 18 years old
- Be a high school graduate or equivalent
- Complete a free eight-hour training
- Commit to tutoring for at least six months (It's okay to go on vacation.)
- Tutor for a minimum of two days per week, 90 minutes per session
