VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT: Richard Mills

Richard Mills has been volunteering in the Friends of the Library bookstore for nearly a decade now – serving his community. He began the job in May of 2008.

"With everything the community has given to me, I feel like I should give back," he said during an interview on his Tuesday afternoon shift. He's on duty on the second and fourth Tuesdays at 3 p.m. and also on Wednesdays.


Richard was born in Virginia, the son of a Marine, so the family moved around quite a bit. They finally stayed in this area after his father, a Vietnam veteran who suffered from the effects of Agent Orange, was stationed at

Camp Pendleton for special training.

Richard stayed here after his father's service and lived in Oceanside about 20 years. "I've been bouncing around North County."

He would like to continue that stable residence history, and his Friends' library service with it, if he can find a new place to live with affordable rent. His disability pension plus survivor's benefits from his father can't stretch around the high cost of living here.

Richard also would have liked to enlist and serve his country as a Marine, but a medical issue prevented it. That same issue has kept him from taking other jobs, but he has been active with the theater program at MiraCosta College, and ushered there.



When he came in to volunteer at the Library he was told they didn't need any help at that moment, but there was an opening in the bookstore. Richard saw people shelving books and figured that's something he could do. Asked what's the best part of his job in the bookstore, Richard replied, "I like the people. I like helping the people. Some are looking for certain things. Some are just browsing around."

There's a Marine who comes in frequently, Richard said. "He has a lot of stories to tell," and Richard likes to "shoot the breeze now and then when he comes in."

For hobbies, he follows baseball because, he said of the players, "I admire their abilities with hand-and-eye coordination," because that's something with which he's always had trouble. He'd not been able to catch the ball when playing with his father, for instance.

Richard also likes to watch television - "mostly mystery shows" – and, working in a bookstore, he likes to read, of course. His favorite writers are Patricia Cornwell and "old-timers" like Raymond Chandler. "I always have a book in my pocket or backpack," Richard said.

Cultivating Community: Summer Reading for Adults

It seemed no one in Oceanside could resist the book's major theme: Art is a means for survival.

Make Connections for Relational Nourishment

[In a recent keynote message at a Cal State University, San Marcos Career Network Luncheon, I spoke of the value of making connections. One assumes this is obvious and expected in developing career connections. Yet I encouraged those present to take networking connection to another level to make something greater, deeper, better - relational nourishment. A faculty member wrote thereafter that this was a generative idea and so I thought to share it with our See Gull readers, to all who are still learning and growing.]

Why make connections? I raised the question to expand the context of Mentoring, under which there is a basic understanding and expectation that one gives and the other receives – a noble act when done with the intent to gift. The real gift is being in relationships with one another. I shared that my very first time I was thanked for being a mentor, I blinked in consternation, as I had no idea. There had been no formal discussion or agreement. The med student had encountered some difficulties and someone suggested to reach out to me. I was thanked by the student for hearing, listening, understanding and not judging. I was just doing my job.

At that time I recalled a time in my undergrad days when a faulty member helped me with a difficulty to make a difference. He was just doing his job. Nothing more than that. But upon reflection, it was more than just doing a job and at that time and by looking back, I was beginning to understand paying it forward.

As professional years grew into leadership roles and being called upon to speak on leadership, I recall hearing of servant leaders. Initially I thought it referred to giving money to deserving recipients or ports of call, only to learn it had little to do with money – and truly more to do with giving. The seven or so hallmark qualities have to do with building your being: Serve First, Build Trust, Live Your Values, Listen to Understand, Think About Your Thinking, Demonstrate Courage, Seek to Increase Your Influence, and Live by Transformational Interactions (not just surface transactions). These are the qualities that bring us into relationships with one another, making a connection with the hope for increasing changes of better, deeper understanding and impact when, where or as needed. That is Relational Nourishment.

I heard Bryan Stevenson - a brilliant attorney – speak at a Palomar College event. He gave a clarion call for engagement with others. He said, "We must find ways to become more proximate with one another." Until that happens, we may not implement the right solution to a problem. Although he was speaking of the larger context of equal justice, the underlying call is for engagement with one another, so as not to embrace a solution that may not be restorative. Use the qualities of becoming a Servant Being first, and the opportunities that can emerge are immeasurable because one doesn't know the connections we are capable of forming with and for one another. Psychologist Theodore Isaac Rubin stated that "Happiness does not come from doing easy work but from the afterglow of satisfaction that comes upon the achievement of a difficult task that demanded our best."

Graduations loom, as well as the Royal Tea of the Friends of the Oceanside Public Library, on May 20. These are moments for developing relations, being present for another, paying it forward to someone who may thrive from your touch - giving and receiving Relational Nourishment.

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
