
TWO UPDATES FROM THE FRIENDS OF THE OCEANSIDE PUBLIC LIBRARY

One way the Friends of the Oceanside Public Library raise funds to support the Library is through your generous donations of books, magazines, DVDs and CDs. Those items are sent to the Friends' sorting facility, and then sold in the Friends bookstores located in the Civic Center and Mission Branch Libraries, on Amazon, and at the Thursday Farmers Market in downtown Oceanside.

When the Library closed in mid-March, this source of revenue came to an end.



But not for long. Gail Wells – Friends volunteer and book sorting facility manager – and her colleagues implemented a win-win way to continue generating revenue: The Buy-the-Box Drive-Through Book Sale.

The plan was to sell books by the box, sorted by category – fiction, nonfiction, children's and so on – and charge \$5 for a box of hardcover books; \$7 for a box of oversized books; and \$5 for a bag of paperbacks.

Since the program launched, thousands of books are now in the hands of customers who are enjoying their reading – and the money they saved.

THE FRIENDS OF THE OCEANSIDE PUBLIC LIBRARY SPONSORED A PROGRAM – AND CREATED A LEGACY FOR FUTURE GENERATIONS

The Friends are committed to supporting Library programs to enrich the community, and that includes sponsoring the annual Summer Reading Program for kids, teens and adults. This year the program moved completely online, and the Library invited the community to *Dig Deeper*, *Oceanside*. The program had two parts:

From June 1 through August 8, participants were invited to commit to reading a specific number of books, and keep an online log of their reading. Kids and teens could earn

free books, meal coupons, and museum passes, and there were ongoing drawings for prizes for all age groups. At the program's end, 740 children, teens and adults had participated, reading 5,601 books!

During that same time period, the Library invited the community to *Dig Deeper into Your Story* by writing their thoughts and experiences about this unique time in history: "Tell your stories that reflect on these past months spent social distancing and/or in quarantine. Give first-hand accounts of the conversations, the protests and changes that you've seen this year."

These *COVID Diaries* were submitted and are available in a digital Biblioboard collection for you – and future generations – to read. The stories are also housed in the Library's Heritage Room, a room dedicated to stories of Oceanside and California's past.

We encourage you to explore this legacy, starting with these excerpts:

"I went to our supermarket and it was a madhouse. People flooding in, no carts available, everyone piling up giant orders on the conveyor belts, people being irritable and arguing with each other in the aisles, just nuts. The virus didn't infect me there, but the panic did. I bought far more than I had intended to and hurried home to shut myself in..."

"I live by myself, and my neighbors aren't home much. I don't really talk to them, just say hi. An emotion I have had is 'stuck alone' and lonely. The whole world is really on quarantine... "

"Every single day gives way
To an array of emotional displays.
Subtle dismay with surges to disobey.
A tapestry of pastures, a relay of gestures.
Saddled on a ride of uncertainty..."



This teen's submission is entitled How I Feel About Quarantine.

"In early July when San Diego County went on the State of California Watch List and reopening was scaled back, I felt Phase 1 fear and despondency all over again. As Juliet Burke said in the TV series Lost, 'It doesn't matter who we were. It only matters who we are.' I watched five seasons of Lost in the Early Days. We are not plane crash survivors on a tropical island, but I sense that my life is permanently changed..."

THE FRIENDS CONGRATULATE – AND THANK – THE LIBRARY STAFF

Applying for grants – that is, applying for non-repayable funds given by one organization to another for a specific purpose – is an integral part of operating a nonprofit. And in 2020, our Library staff did a masterful job of researching and writing grant applications.

More than \$267,000 was awarded to Oceanside Public Library in the form of 10 grants from the California State Library, the Federal Communication Commission, and California Humanities.

One example: The California Humanities grant of \$5,000 was applied for by Erin Nakasone, Librarian II, Youth Services. The funding was used for a five-day September program series called *Yōkoso!* or "Welcome" in Japanese, An Online Celebration of Japanese Culture.

The series included daily Japanese storytimes on YouTube along with special events for all ages: an Origami Crane workshop and Community Art Project; a Marble Ink Paper Art demonstration; a tour of the Japanese Friendship Garden in Balboa Park; and a traditional Okinawan *eisa* drumming performance. All the events were on Zoom, Instagram, or YouTube, and participants received a kit of art materials and two books to assist in learning the Japanese written and spoken language.



Eisa is a folk dance that honors the spirits of the performers' ancestors.

The Friends congratulate and thank the Library staff for their ongoing efforts to secure additional funding that allows for even greater outreach to, and enrichment of, our community.



ALMA'S THINGS CONSIDERED A TIME IN THE LIFE OF THE OCEANSIDE PUBLIC LIBRARY BOARD OF TRUSTEES by Alma Sisco-Smith, President **Library Board Of Trustees**

I have the great pleasure of serving as president of the Library Board of Trustees – but what is the Board, and what does it do?

The Board is a group of five volunteers appointed by the Mayor with the consent of the City Council: Paula DeBell, vice president; Dr. Adrianne Hakes, Secretary; William Loftus, EdD, trustee; Charlene Williamson, trustee; and myself. The Board was founded in 1904, the same year as the Library's founding.

The role of the Library Board of Trustees is to oversee Library operations and approve rules and regulations regarding Library hours, services and materials. The Trustees set policy, provide direction for the services, make recommendations to City Council on the budget, authorize payments for Library operations, and monitor expenditures. For example, the Library's expenditures for FY 2019-2020 came in at 97% for administrative and overall 95.6% for materials.

We met in late August, only our second meeting after COVID-19 hit in March and the Library closed. The Board members were highly impressed as one agenda item after another revealed how spectacularly the Library staff had pivoted to a new normal in order to continue services to the community. One example: The home delivery of books and other materials, more than 18,000 items at the time of our meeting.

A phenomenal outcome of work-at-home was that Library staff took advantage of more than 50 training programs provided through the American Library Association. One critical training was Cultivating Racial Equality and Inclusion (CREI) – ours was the only library in San Diego County participating. This led to the staff's development of a public statement endorsed by the Board, and new CREI goals will be added to Library's 2020-2023 Strategic Plan Update.

At our meeting we also welcomed Bill Loftus (pictured) to the Board. As an elementary and secondary school principal – first in the suburbs of Chicago and later retiring from Vista School District – Bill's interests have always been serving the needs of students and families.



While accustomed to many dry-run drills for "duck and cover" from tornadoes to earthquake drills, Bill notes, "They don't come close to the 'shelter-in-place' orders we have struggled under since mid-March. Though closing our City's Libraries is not as tragic as turning off the fresh water supplies to residents, I can only assume the toll the lack of services is taking on our Oceanside neighbors. This is the reason I offered to serve on the Library Board after completing my term as a Commissioner with Parks and Recreation. I hope I can help to continue to serve our population, along with the seniors and homeless individuals who have used our Libraries as a refuge and a place to connect with the world outside of Oceanside."

The Friends of Oceanside Public Library suspended all planning for fundraisers, the Library bookstores were closed, and these reliable sources of revenue dried up. For the Friends, who thrive on supporting the Library, it was the worst of times.

So Friends president Chris Wilson took matters in hand and redesigned our website to make it easier to become a Friend, increase your membership level and/or donate – the best of times.

The Library has reopened, the bookstores will be back in business, and the Friends are once again planning fundraisers to continue supporting the purchase of books and other materials, and sponsoring programs and events that enrich the lives of our community.


