OCEANSIDE PUBLIC LIBRARY TEAM SECURED \$300,000+ IN GRANTS IN FY 20/21!

In 2021 – the Friends' 50th Anniversary year – you read about members of the Friends of the Oceanside

Public Library Board in the See Gull newsletters.

When you see Friends Board members, it's a sure thing that they're either (a) planning a fundraiser for the Library; (b) holding a fundraiser; or (c) planning their next fundraiser.

All funds raised by the Friends help support Oceanside Public Library's programs, events for all ages, and the purchase of books and materials.

There's another group also working to secure funds for the Library – this group is made up of Library staff and the management team.



The grant-funded Early Learning Hub at the Civic Center Library is a resource for families and children ages 0-5.

And when you see them, it's a sure thing that they're either (a)

planning to apply for a grant; (b) applying for a grant; or (c) planning their next grant application.

What is a "grant"?

A grant is an award of money made by one party – a corporation or foundation, for example – to another party, such as a nonprofit entity.

Applying for this award is called the "grant-writing process," and it involves many hours of research, collecting documentation, writing and rewriting to clearly express the reasons for requesting the grant, how the money will be used, how the community will benefit, and how the grant will advance the Library's mission, vision and goals.

Every grant applied for presents its own unique challenges, but the grant-writing team is so expert at meeting these challenges that during FY 20/21 the Library received more than \$300,000 in grant funding.

This funding is used for special projects, and can also "include a staffing component which allows us to hire temporary staff to help accomplish the work of the grant," says Library Director Sherri Cosby. Examples include the summer STEAM Camps for kids in grades 1-4; the Civic Center Library's Early Learning Hub for

families and children ages 0-5; and Teens Work, a paid internship program that helps teens gain work experience and develop soft skills such as teamwork and problem-solving.

Another example is "the Adult and Family literacy grants that are the primary funding source for our READS Learning Center," says Cosby, "and we have been receiving this grant for over 20 years."

These are just a few examples of how the 17 grants the Library received in FY 20/21 are utilized, but the grant-writing team – like the Friends – is never satisfied with a "job well done."

Both the Library team and the Friends are committed to the ongoing securing of funds that support the Library's mission: *To engage, inform, connect and inspire.*

ALMA'S THINGS CONSIDERED: MINDFULNESS OR MINDLESSNESS: THE TIPPING POINT by Alma Sisco-Smith, President, Library Board of Trustees

As I sat to write in the early hours days ago, my thoughts went to May 2013. That was the beginning of my commitment to write and the gift of a public platform to raise it up and out.

I began this column dedicated to focusing on the aspects of education ("reading, writing and 'rithmetic") and the concerns and importance of our humanity (the quality and state of being humane).

As our years came face-to-face with 2021, the question raised up in me: What have I done? Has it been mindful or mindless? Was there a tipping point? Looking back, there seemed little doubt that COVID 2020 – with its horrors – also brought forward the need to persevere. My focus shifted onto young girls of color to support them through a mentoring program that kept a focus on our humanity and education and self-care practice during the time. Undeniably, it was a tipping point to be mindful – despite the horrific impacts on so

many lives, yet we must find a value in mindfulness. We were working on our resilience and we felt some joy.

Yet as 2021 began with COVID tampering down, and cultural wars bursting up across our country, my ability to focus became challenged as well as my sense of emotional balance. Tears of frustration and anger quickly forming over the different kind of losses now. The loss of our humanity, caught up in political masks of hate for each other. I had to focus on faith in a spiritual journey that embodied community conversations in search of mindful dialogue to

Mindfulness opens up to the possibility of appreciating the fullness of our humanity as we are, and of embodying and expressing that humanity in our way of being and in our actions. Mindlessness, on the other hand, closes us up and sadly constrains both the expression and the enjoyment of our life as it is unfolding.

achieve mutual understanding. As a result, I became Surprised by Hope, from the writings of N.T. Wright.

It was a difficult sprint, coming through to the early hours to begin this writing. However, it left no doubt that 2021, tampering with the joys of mindfulness, leading towards despair and fatigue of mindlessness, was a tipping point.

Do you see the irony here? These switching moments between mindfulness and mindlessness inform us that we must stay alert, be informed and stay committed – around us and within us. And as we do this, let it be in the spirit of placing value and faith in our humanity.

IF YOU'RE IN A BOOK CLUB, OR THINKING OF STARTING ONE...

The practice of people forming clubs to discuss books and ideas is a time-honored tradition in this country, going back to Founding Father Benjamin Franklin and possibly earlier. Today it's estimated that more than five million people belong to book clubs, and that number continues to grow.

As writer Mikkaka Overstreet put it in a recent article,

We humans are social creatures. We love to share experiences with others. Thus, it's no wonder that when a book inspires us, haunts us, comforts us, consumes us, or transforms us, we want to share those feelings with others.

If you're part of this book club tradition or thinking of starting a book club, Oceanside Public Library invites you to explore BCIB – Book Club in a Bag.

BCIB offers more than 50 popular titles that Library staff select from a variety of sources including book club choices, One Book/One San Diego titles, and Big Read selections. "Books that have been turned into movies or series do really well as BCIB

options," said Librarian II Trista Tabanico, "like *The Secret Life of Bees* and *The Zookeepers Wife*, so we have those types of books available. We want books that appeal to all adult readers, so we make sure to have fiction, nonfiction, social justice and urban fiction, mystery, science fiction/fantasy, and biographies as well."

"Each set of five+ books comes with a binder full of fun things to help lead a book club and get discussions flowing. The binders include a book club *How To* which is especially helpful for clubs that are just starting out or going through some transitions, and it covers how to read, think about and talk about a book, as well as lead a book club."

"Also included are icebreakers, a book summary, an author bio, book-specific and genre-specific discussion questions. Mystery or fiction books read differently than science fiction and nonfiction books, so it's nice to have a core set of questions to swap if desired. Each binder also includes a trifold for Libby by Overdrive services for customers who prefer eBooks or Audiobooks to physical copies."

"All of these materials are designed and included to help make each book club experience as successful as possible!"

To get started, check the BCIB list by <u>clicking here</u>, or by going to the Library's website and clicking "Book Clubs" on the "Adults" tab. The materials have a six-week checkout time, and a Library card is required.

Once you've made your selection, call the Library at (760) 435-5600, or contact Trista directly at (760) 435-5577 or at ttabanico@oceansideca.org. If you have suggestions for additions to the list, let Trista know.

Your Book Club in a Bag will be checked out to you, and you can request either the Civic Center or Mission Branch Library as your pickup location. You can also request that your BCIB be delivered – just verify that you're set up for the Library's Home Delivery service.

Whether you're a long-time book clubber or just getting started, the Library has everything you need for a successful gathering. All you have to do is come prepared to share – and enjoy.

But don't forget the snacks!





Shoppers can search for a specific title or author, or browse and make their selection.





THE LIBRARY'S FILM COLLECTION JUST KEEPS GROWING AND GROWING...

Have you watched all the movies on the American Film Institute's (AFI) list of 100 Years...100 Movies?

You can – if you're an Oceanside Public Library cardholder.

Over the past year, Amy Davis, Senior Library Assistant – Collection Management, has been diligently working to expand the Library's film collection, including checking every box on the AFI's 100 Years...100 Movies list. Get your viewing started by accessing that same list here-new-management/,

Other additions to the collection include Pioneers of African American Cinema, a preserved collection on five DVDs featuring more than 20 films including restored feature films, as well as a number of short films, fragments, and documentaries,

known as "race films," made by groundbreaking African American directors for black audiences from 1915 to 1946. In addition, Amy has added nine movies from the Harlem Double Feature/Harlem Classics collection, including five directed by Oscar Micheaux, described as "the most successful African-American

filmmaker of the first half of the 20th century." You can find these films by searching for African American Directors.

And, says Amy, she's far from finished. "I'm actively purchasing award-winning foreign and independent films, movies by women, People of Color (POC), and lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer and intersex (LGBTQI+) directors and writers."

It's easy to stay up-to-date on the Library's new DVDs – on the home page click the "Library Catalog" button, then click "Show me the new DVDs" or click here.

DVD purchases are made possible in part by funds from the Friends of the Oceanside Public Library.

Why is the Library fine free?

While intended to incentivize the return of Library material, fines unintentionally create a barrier for patrons to access critical Library services that disproportionately affect families with young children, low-income households and customers in our community who need us the most.

Following a vote by the Library Board of Trustees, all overdue fines accumulated as a result of returning materials late have been removed from customers' Library accounts.

If you have other charges, such as lost or damaged fees, those will remain. After you enjoy your materials

during the loan period, you can return them, or renew them online by <u>clicking here</u> or via phone at (760) 435-5600 on or before the due date.
