





After you enjoy those books, DVDs or CDs, you return them – to be borrowed again.


Here's another way you recycle: When you access the Library's many online resources for books, movies, magazines, games and more, you're recycling, since someone else will come along after you and use that same resource.

So, the next time you borrow from the Library, or shop at the Friends' bookstores – give yourself a big green thumbs-up!





ALMA'S THINGS CONSIDERED:

Resting, Reading, and Roaring with Joy by Alma Sisco-Smith, Member, Library Board of Trustees

Resting the body provided time to let the eyes do more work! Let me explain. The first half of July was spent with COVID and COVID Rebound, followed by the first two weeks of August on bedrest for a tortured back to heal. Agony, you say? Yes, but reading (and writing) nourished the soul.

The time allowed me to catch up on a small stack of past articles, including *How Fighting Over Grammar Can Help Fix a Divided America* by Ellen Jovin, lifelong professional grammarian, teacher, writer, and student of more than 25 languages.

On a September day, Ellen set up a table and chair outside with a sign marked "Grammar Table." It took less than 30 seconds to receive the first question, she noted, and the queries rapidly continued thereafter. People stopping may have challenged another regarding use of commas, punctuation, and overrun sentences, while others took on certain pet peeves, such as whether a sentence can end with a preposition. It became notable that people left with a sense of renewal as well as fellowship. She began to move the Grammar Table around the city, and repeatedly seeing the impact of engagement, accepting corrections and yes, friendships building.

Ellen and her husband took this on as a documentary within six months and as the pandemic landed in 2020, they had visited and voiced their Grammar Table in 47 states. Clearly the Grammar Table had become more than an exercise on grammar. It was about community building, even revealing that debate can be gentle – sometimes silly – and even humorous when demonstrated in good-natured disagreement with smiles.

"Neither snow nor rain nor heat nor gloom of night..."

This title is a phrase we associate with the U.S. Postal Service and its commitment to delivering our mail.

And neither did the pandemic.

That phrase is equally applicable to the Friends' commitment to raising funds to support Oceanside Public Library – a commitment that's lasted for more than 50 years.

Neither snow nor rain nor heat... have stopped the Friends' fundraising efforts.

In March 2020 when the Library closed, the pandemic halted all in-person fundraising efforts and closed the Friends' bookstores.

But the pandemic *didn't* completely stop the Friends from raising funds – they ramped up their creative thinking, and got to work.

One example of that creative thinking was the brainchild of Friends Board member Donna Locke: the Friends' first Amateur Photography Contest.

Launched in May 2021, the contest invited participants to photograph images "that represent what community and joy mean to each individual," and a small donation was requested for submissions. So – fundraiser + fun for participants + no in-person required.

The response was so strong that the Friends hosted their 2nd Annual Amateur Photography Contest this past spring, this time with the theme of *Capturing Your City: Urban Life*. Like the 2021 contest, Donna managed this event, which received numerous wonderful submissions from all age groups.

Donna is something of an expert juggler – in addition to contest planning and organizing, she's also manager of the Friends' Amazon Bookstore, an important part of the Friends' fundraising efforts. Donated books, along with unopened DVDs and CDs, are sorted, their condition rated, and the item is priced, photographed (if needed) and uploaded to the website. Sold items are wrapped and shipped, money raised is tracked and deposited – and all this is happening simultaneously under Donna's watchful eyes.

As Friends' Vice President Mona Marra put it, "Donna loves to take on challenges, and she goes all out to learn everything she can for a positive outcome. Her organizational skills in setting up and taking over our Amazon operation were amazing!"



Ellen states, "There are serious challenges to our public life that the bonding of dependent and independent clauses cannot solve. Americans must still coexist with other Americans whose views they abhor. Lives lived too much online are vulnerable to misunderstanding and rage, to dangerous oversimplification and dehumanization."

I recommend Ellen Jovin's book: *Rebel with a Clause: Tales and Tips from a Roving Grammarian*, available at the Library through LINK+.

COOKING WITH FRIENDS

by Genevieve Wunder, Friends Board Member Air Fryer Peanut Butter Cookies

EASY: Only Three Ingredients!!!

1 cup peanut butter

1 cup granulated sugar

1 egg

(No need to preheat the air fryer for this recipe.)

- 1. Mix the peanut butter, sugar and egg until you have a creamy consistency; do not overmix.
- 2. Cover the bottom of the air fryer basket with air fryer parchment paper.
- 3. Drop the cookie dough in rounded teaspoons onto the parchment paper. If desired, use a fork to mash marks onto the tops of the cookies this allows for even cooking.
- 4. Put the basket into your air fryer and cook at 400 degrees for 4-7 minutes or until the cookies are golden brown.
- 5. Remove the basket from the air fryer but leave the cookies in the basket to cool slightly before transferring them to a cooling rack; they'll crumble if you try to move them too soon.
- 6. Not all air fryers cook the same so check the cookies; you don't want to overcook them.

WHAT DO THE FRIENDS FIND IN BOOKS...BESIDES A GOOD STORY?

The See Gull editor has a friend who volunteers at a Colorado library, and the friend recently talked about the interesting – and sometimes strange – items they find in returned and donated books: a large marijuana leaf, a live earwig (ew), love letters, credit cards, photos, Kleenex, French fries and more.

So we asked volunteer Blake Kern, manager of the Friends' book sorting room, what she and her team find in donated books. Blake didn't mention live animals or food, but she did say, "Pressed flowers and leaves, partially used gift cards, photos, stamps, postcards, bookmarks, newspaper clippings, receipts, recipes, utility bills...all sorts of things."



"Probably the most memorable was when a large donation of items came in and I found \$1,500. I knew who had made the donation, so we contacted them and were they glad to hear from us! A member of the family collected the money and gave the Friends \$50 for their trouble."

It's rare that the Friends can track down donors, and we don't want you to lose a precious photo, love letter or other important item, so please – check your books before you donate or return them!
