

THE FRIENDS ARE BUSY INSIDE – AND OUTSIDE – THE LIBRARY!

We all know that the all-volunteer Friends of the Oceanside Public Library are busy *inside* the Library, at their bookstores located in the Civic Center and Mission Branch Libraries.

This includes assisting customers with finding just the right items and helping with their purchases; bringing in new inventory every week; setting up the displays for the Monthly Special Book Bargains (see page 9); and stocking the shelves with the used books, DVDs, CDs and other items generously donated by our community.

The money generated by the Friends' bookstores is a crucial part of the fundraising that supports the

Library's purchase of books and other materials, programs, events and more.

What you may *not* know is that the Friends are also busy *outside* the Library.

One recent example was the Friends' attendance at the 10th Serving with a Purpose conference, an event designed exclusively for library advocates and Board members, and the staff that support them. The conference provides relevant training, resources and inspiration to Board members of Friends of the Library groups, Library Foundations, and Library Trustees and Commissioners, and – as their website notes – an opportunity for "exploring together how we can continue the building and leading of our organizations to last another 100 years."

The goal of the Chamber is "A Thriving and United Oceanside," and MainStreet's mission is the development of downtown Oceanside as a "pedestrian-friendly community for both residents and visitors."

ARE YOU USING THIS FREE LIBRARY SERIVCE?

The Friends are proud that their support of the Library includes the purchase of books. But they're also aware that *no* library's collection can include *all* the books that customers want.

So here's a *Friend-ly* reminder about a *free* library service: LINK+.

LINK+ is a catalog of more than 4.5 million unique titles available from more than 55 public and academic libraries across California. This service



allows library cardholders to borrow books not available at Oceanside Public Library, and not just books – but DVDs and CDs as well.

When you go online and request your item, you can choose your pickup location – the Civic Center or Mission Branch Library – or use the Library's free home delivery



e Gull

service. You can also ask a Library staff member to request your item. It usually arrives within seven days, and the loan period for most items is 21 days with one renewal.

And when you use LINK+ you'll be in good company: From January to June 2023 more than 4,000 LINK+ items were borrowed by Library cardholders!

The Friends encourage you to use LINK+, a free and easy-to-use service that will expand your reading, watching and listening horizons.



There are three things nonprofit organizations, like the Friends, ask of their members: Treasure, Time, and Talent.



VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT: MEET JEAN!

The next time you're at the Civic Center Library on a Monday morning, stop by the Friend's bookstore and say hello to volunteer Jean Burns. She's there every Monday morning, where she loves being surrounded by books, and bringing books and people together.

Jean's been volunteering at the Civic Center bookstore for six years, but she's loved libraries for as long as she can remember. She grew up in Pasadena, going to a library "that was like a temple," she recalls. "Libraries are so important – they change peoples' lives. Libraries offer so much free information, and that helps hold our democracy together."

But Jean's volunteering began long before the Friends' bookstore. Let's go back to the early 1990s, when she became one of the founders of OMA – the <u>Oceanside Museum of Art</u>.



"It took several years of planning and fundraising before we were able to open" she said, but the founders persevered and OMA opened in 1995, with Jean as one of the original Board members, then as the museum's second president, and now as an Emeritus Board member.

The museum's mission is to offer exhibitions and programs that bring people together to explore the art and stories of Southern California artists, and when you visit OMA, said Jean, "you'll see it's a beautiful place to do that." And if you haven't visited OMA, Jean added, "Please do!"

The 1990s were also when Jean began a long-term project: walking the beaches of California. This project would ultimately span 20 years of discovering, enjoying, taking pictures and recording thoughts, starting with the beaches in Oceanside, and then heading south. After she reached the U.S./Mexico border, Jean turned her feet north.

Los Angeles, Santa Barbara, San Francisco, returning home between trips, then heading further north, all the way to Pelican State Beach. "Once I got to the California/Oregon border, I wanted to see the Oregon beaches, too. And then Washington. I ended up walking beaches all the way to Canada!"

Jean thought her journey had ended with those 200+ beaches, but instead her journey took her in an unexpected direction: From book lover to book *author*.

"I'm not a writer," she said firmly. "But I had my pictures and my thoughts, and my daughter, who wanted to



help, so...we did a book." Jean's book, *Blue Adventures: Walking the West Coast Beaches* from Mexico to Canada, was published in 2016 and is available in the Library catalog.

And Jean is still walking; several years ago she brought some neighbors together to form a daily walking group. One of those neighbors – Friends' Vice President Mona Marra – said, "I call Jean my 'walking mentor.' I don't like exercising, and she is the reason I get out there most days and do so. The neighbor walking group solves all the world's problems as we walk and talk!"

So – note written: "Meet Jean." Stop by the Civic Center Library Friends' Bookstore, Monday mornings, and swap family stories. Jean has plenty, with her family of four children, nine grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. Ask her about walking West Coast beaches or her walking group, or OMA, or chat about her other interests, like bridge club and classical music and tennis.

And ask Jean about books. She'll be happy to help!

The Friends Want You to Know About... OCEANSIDE PUBLIC LIBRARY'S AUTISM-FRIENDLY COLLECTION

You may already know that the Library's collection includes toys for babies, toddlers and preschoolers. Play is fun and is how young children learn about themselves and the world around them, and the Library is committed to providing toys that educate, engage and entertain young children.


But you may *not* know that the Library's collection also includes autismfriendly toys and books designed to support children with autism spectrum disorder (ASD) and their parents, caregivers and educators. The circulating collection includes books and resources relating to ASD; therapeutic and sensory toys; assistive technology materials; and speech therapy and sign cards.

Amy Kleman, Principal Librarian/Youth Services, said, "There are books in our Autism Collection, located with other parenting materials, geared towards caregivers, individuals with autism and anyone who wants to learn about living with the characteristics of autism. In this collection, people of all ages can learn about and celebrate our differences; all people should be seen and understood."

The Library provides age guidelines to assist in choosing a toy, or other material, that is developmentally



appropriate for the safety and benefit of all ages. Toys for children ages three and up may include small parts and ARE NOT recommended for infants, toddlers or anyone who might ingest the toy piece. All toys in the Library's collection are cleaned after each loan.

ALMA'S THINGS CONSIDERED: *The Value of Our History* by Alma Sisco-Smith, Member, Library Board of Trustees

Recently, I had the honor of standing at the base of the escalator at San Diego airport awaiting the return of Honor Flight San Diego from Washington, D.C. with 90 of our local

veterans. Those from World War II, Korea and Vietnam were being recognized by the thousands that were now packed into the baggage claim area. In this perfect spot for reception, my family and I awaited in anticipation to see my husband (their father and grandfather) as he arrived at the top platform. The flood of emotion for one and for all was riveting!

The following Friday, an elementary school held a fundraiser organized by their fifth-grade class to raise support for the Honor Flight Guardians, those who travel as companions with each honored veteran. Here

we now would see – up front and personal – the meeting of minds, the voices of children, parents, and veterans in an exchange of information.

As the youngsters came up to say "Thank you for your service," several asked: "What did you do?" or, "What is this badge for?" or, "Would you go again?" Near the end of the three hours of activity there were more exchanges that resonated with the world today, and issues that are arising. Several parents said this is a show of history repeating itself, and our children need to know the true stories. That the good, the bad and the ugly is knowledge to be understood, not banned.

Moving forward today, we cannot shy away from discussion and recognition of the need for valuing and understanding our humanity. Thinking it is "just politics" encourages us to turn away. I suggest it is within each of us to learn and grow in understanding. It is through engaging with one another – oftentimes in uncomfortable conversation – that we can learn, see, and feel the meaning of equality and dignity.

Oceanside Public Library – the holder of knowledge in books and information – is key to our education. Their additional steps toward



community circles can build bridges, not barriers that are more like war zones.

organizations who wish to recognize our veterans' contributions, and thank them for their service to and sacrifice for the United States and its citizens. There is no cost for the veteran to go on his/her Honor Flight.

COOKING WITH FRIENDS

Amish Apple Fritters

- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1/4 cup granulated sugar
- 1 tablespoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 2 large eggs

1/2 cup milk1 teaspoon vanilla extract2 cups finely chopped applesVegetable oil for fryingPowdered sugar for dusting



- 1. In a large bowl, whisk together the flour, sugar, baking powder, cinnamon, and salt.
- 2. In a separate bowl, beat the eggs, milk, and vanilla extract until well combined.
- 3. Add the wet ingredients to the dry ingredients and mix until just combined.
- 4. Fold in the chopped apples.
- 5. Heat the vegetable oil in a large, deep skillet over medium heat.
- 6. Drop the batter by the tablespoonful into the hot oil, making sure not to overcrowd the skillet.
- 7. Fry the fritters for two to three minutes per side, or until golden brown and cooked through.
- 8. Remove fritters from the oil with a slotted spoon and place them on a paper towel-lined plate to drain.
- 9. Dust the fritters with powdered sugar and serve warm.




A Message From the Friends:

The article quoted a report from the American Library Association which said, in part:

"...more than 2,500 different books were objected to, compared to 1,858 in 2021 and just 566 in 2019. In numerous cases, hundreds of books were challenged in a single complaint."


If you believe in the freedom to make your own reading choices, here's a good response to book ban attempts:

"The Library defends the rights of individuals to access information, free from censorship, and defends free speech as protected by the Constitution of the United States."




The Friends wholeheartedly support the Library's policy, and that includes in our funding of book purchases.




