
YOUR DONATIONS HELP EXPAND THE LIBRARY'S COLLECTION!

The books above and below are just some of your hardback donations headed for the Library's collection.


"One example of this is *Spare*, by Prince Harry – we've been able to add additional copies because of donations. Donated bestsellers enable the Library to save money

BANNED BOOKS WEEK IS OCTOBER 1-7: HOW ARE YOU CELEBRATING YOUR FREEDOM TO READ?

"The American Library Association's Office for Intellectual Freedom documented 1,269 demands to censor library books and resources in 2022, the highest number since they began documenting this statistic," shares Library Director CJ Di Mento. In 2022, 90% of reported book challenges were demands to censor multiple titles – and of those demands to censor library books, 40% sought to remove or restrict more than 100 books all at once. "At this time, and at all times, it is important to make it known that we support the freedom to read."

The Friends stand by Oceanside Public Library's Supporting Intellectual Freedom policy, which states:

• The Library defends the rights of individuals to access information, free from censorship, and defends free speech as protected by the Constitution of the United States.

The Friends suggest a great way to celebrate Banned Books Week all year round: Read Banned Books.

Recently we learned about an organization that has its own response to book banning: the Banned Bookmobile!

Since July 2023, the Banned Bookmobile (pictured) has been touring the U.S., handing out free copies of challenged books such as Toni Morrison's *The Bluest Eye*, Amanda Gorman's *The Hill We Climb* and Art Spiegelman's *Maus*.

The organization is MoveOn.org, and according to their executive director, "...our bookmobile will give people access to books that are inclusive of the full diversity and experiences of all of our communities."

ALMA'S THINGS CONSIDERED: Let's Watch Out for Each Other by Alma Sisco-Smith, Member, Library Board of Trustees

Such a simple yet profound statement, I thought, as I spotted the lit roadway sign. For some reason it hit me like a spark, and I immediately realized it was just that indeed. Three relatively recent moments began to flood my brain.

One was a message from a well-known former educator and friend of the library who has now passed away — and wrote to me in 2021 asking if we might work to inform and educate our community about Critical Race Theory. A second event

occurred a few weeks ago. I was thinking about someone, and incredibly, just hours later I received a call from that individual with a plea for help with a medical need. The third was just two nights ago while watching a play, completely unsuspecting in advance that it would have anything to do with what all three would exemplify – the idea of "watch out for each other."

The former educator was invested in racial equity and was a white male. The acquaintance in need of help with a medical matter happened to be a black female doctor. The play was *Tarzan*, and a beautiful panoply of different living and loving creatures that, through their intersectionality, removed hatred and misunderstanding. To me, these three examples show us how important and necessary it is to watch out for each other.


More specifically, these examples brought together my two sustaining cultural interests – Education and Humanity. The stirrings of our brain power with our emotions and feelings that reach into our hearts and with the watch, perhaps, of Divine Intervention to help feed our spiritual growth.

Our Library is rich with myriad material and information about which we can educate ourselves to be better informed in caring for one another. Do we stand aside and let misinformation guide us along or do we delve into the issues that confront us and watch out for each other, to make us better as individuals, better as a community and as a better world?

WHAT LIVES ON THE LIBRARY'S LINKS?

When you visit the Oceanside Public Library website, on the homepage you'll see tabs that say, "About Us," "Browse," "Services," "Events" and "I Want To..."

What's *under* those tabs are resources that the Friends are proud to help support – and want *you* to know about.



For example, if you like learning about our local history, on the "<u>Browse</u>" tab click "Special Collections" for the Helen M. Nelson Heritage Room. Located in the Civic Center Library, this houses the Library's special collection of over 2,500 books, historical files, clippings and photographs with an emphasis on local history including Southern California and Oceanside.

The "Services" tab has a dozen options including resources for everyone from kids to lifelong learners, and veterans will find VetNow, along with hotlines and links to local, state and federal resources.

There's much more living on the Library's links – and the Friends say, "Happy exploring!"

READING FOR PLEASURE

Friends Vice President Mona Marra was touched by how eloquently this essay conveyed the joy of reading for pleasure. She asked us to share it – see if it resonates with you, too.

Every book has the potential to touch the human soul deeply, arousing patterns of thought that might otherwise have lain dormant. The pleasure we derive from the written word is unique in that we must labor

for it. Other forms of art provide us with stimulus and ask nothing more than our emotional response. Reading is an *active* pastime that requires an investment of emotion as well as our concentration and imagination. The words we read are merely a starting point for a process that takes place largely within our minds and hearts.

There are few activities as comforting, relaxing, and healthy as perusing the pages of a good piece of fiction or nonfiction. Curling up with a book and a cup of tea is one of the simplest ways we can remove ourselves from the confines of reality in order to immerse ourselves in the drama and intrigue of the unfamiliar. However, the pleasure of transcending reality is only one aspect of the reading experience.



Each time we read for enjoyment, whether we prefer the fantastic nature of fiction, the empathy awakened within us by memoir, or the instructive passion of nonfiction, we create entire landscapes in our mind's eye. The books we choose provide us with the inspiration we need to accomplish such a feat, but it is our own



creative reserves that empower us to use our imaginations for this unique and beautiful purpose.

The tales you lose yourself in can lead you on paths of discovery that take you out of your own life and help you see that existence can unfold in an infinite number of ways. You can learn so much from the characters and mentors who guide you from page to page. Your emotions are awakened each time you read, allowing you to become a vessel for the passion that pours forth from line after line of print.

Ultimately, the books you absorb – those that touch you deeply – will become a part of who you are, providing you with a rich and thrilling world within that you can revisit anytime you wish by simply closing your eyes.

If you haven't read a book for pleasure lately, try and allow yourself the time – you deserve it.

COOKING WITH FRIENDS

Blueberry Cookies

1 cup flour

½ teaspoon baking powder

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/₃ cup vegan butter, softened

⅓ cup + 1 tablespoon sugar

1/3 cup frozen blueberries

½ cup white chocolate chips or shavings

- 1. In a small bowl whisk together flour, baking powder, and salt set aside.
- 2. Thaw blueberries in microwave for about one minute until berries are soft and jam-like let cool.
- 3. Cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy.
- 4. Add in blueberries and mix on high until fully incorporated.
- 5. Fold in the dry ingredients gradually.
- 6. Mix in white chocolate.

Chill dough in freezer for about 30 minutes.

Preheat oven to 400 degrees.

Shape into 12 equal-size balls and place on parchment paper-lined baking sheet. Bake for 10-12 minutes.

Let cool, serve, and enjoy – maybe with a glass of milk!

SORTING OUT OUR SORTING ROOM

When you walk into any of the Friends of the Oceanside Public Library bookstores, have you ever wondered how the books got there? Well, the magic all happens in the Friends' Book Sorting Room!

Until September 2021, the sorting room was conveniently located on Civic Center Drive behind the Library, but this building was torn down and a new Fire Station #1 is now being constructed in its place. When the notice was given to move, it took time and a lot of hard work to find a new facility and then to move everything to the new location on Roymar Road.

The magic actually starts with you, our generous donors, from whom the Friends of the Oceanside Public Library receive donations on a daily basis. Books are dropped off at the Mission Branch or Civic Center Libraries, others are picked up by sorting room volunteers, and more are delivered to the sorting room by appointment. These books, DVDs, CDs, puzzles and audio books are then unloaded and sorted. Some items go to our Amazon Marketplace to be listed and sold, but most are priced and sent

to be sold at the Farmers Market or one of our three bookstores located at the Mission Branch and Civic Center Libraries, or Jane & Evie's Used Books on Coast Highway.

Books are sometimes distributed and sold directly from the sorting room in ways that might include filling special requests for people in the community. The Friends sell books at fundraising events; Susan buys boxes of Spanish books for schools down in Mexico; Sarah buys boxes of large print books for her retirement community's library; books are sold to the Operation Book Support wholesaler who pays the Friends quarterly for specific titles; and books that can't be sold are purchased by the pound by the Discover Books organization.

The magic of teamwork makes all this happen – from the Library personnel who deliver donations daily, to the Friends volunteers in the sorting room. Big shout-outs to Regina, who sorts and prices children's books for the stores, and gathers the Farmers Market inventory each week; to Lulu who keeps our paperback books organized and priced, and does whatever else is needed; to Connie, who unloads donations and inspects our CDs and DVDs; and Joe, who sorts the magazines, empties the trash, and does all our muscle work!

You may have wondered what happens to all that money you spend buying books from the Friends. Well, each year the Friends' Board meets with the Library Director and determines the amount of support the Friends will give. In the past 10+ years this has amounted to well over one million dollars! These monies support our Library programs above and beyond what the City of Oceanside's general fund allots to the Library.
